# Narrator?

The narrator is an old Scottish woman confined to her bed due to old age. She complains about the lack of excitement in her life and is bitter about the fact her body has let her down. She likes to complain and is mainly negative.

# Relationship between characters

The woman is conflicted about whether to be grateful to her daughter or criticise her for not helping more. While the mother acknowledges the burden she is, she also complains about a lot of the daughter's decisions. We get the impression they have nothing to say to each other anymore and the relationship is auite strained.

# Narrator?

Jackie Kay narrates this poem about her own personal experience. We get the impression the speaker is strained and anxious about the relationship with her mother. She struggles to accept the lack of connection but eventually comes to terms with this.

# Relationship between characters

The relationship is very strained and uncomfortable as we see Kay's birth mother refuse to open up. Kay is trying desperately to form a relationship but come to accept that she doesn't know this woman and never will. The mother appears anxious and possibly guilty in the poem.

### Narrator?

She comes across as quite childish in her fascinations and unaware of class differences.

# Relationship between characters

The girl is clearly very close to her grandmother and is fascinated by her previous life. The grandmother tries to prepare the girl for life by taking her to church and showing her how to work. While the girl is imaginative and unburdened, the grandmother has a very serious and mature take on life. The girl is also fascinated by the modern world but the grandmother seems set in her ways.

# Narrator?

The narrator is Jackie Kay as an adult. She shares her excitement over her son being born 18 years ago then goes on to show how much she misses him in the present day. We see the speaker isn't coping well with her son's departure and get a sense of her anxiety and pride.

# Relationship between characters

Kay and Matthew are clearly very close. She expresses her longing to meet him as a baby and her upset when he leaves on his gap year. While he is also fond of his mother, we get the feeling he is less inclined to think of her as he craves his own independence. We see the clear bond between mother and son as she reveals how proud she is of him despite his desire to leave.
